3 Septic System

Onamac has two types of septic systems: **Onsite Septic Systems (OSS)** and a **Large Onsite Sewage System (LOSS)**. OSS are governed by Island County and LOSS are governed by Washington State.

3.1 Onsite Septic System (OSS)

An on-site sewage system (OSS) is an integrated system of components, located on or nearby the property it serves, that conveys, stores, treats, and/or provides subsurface soil treatment and dispersal of sewage. It consists of a collection system, a treatment component or treatment sequence, and a soil dispersal component. An on-site sewage system may also refer to a holding tank sewage system or another system that does not have a soil dispersal component.

Island County Department:

OSS are overseen by Island County's **Department of Public Health**, who provide the following services:

- Soil Evaluation determining site suitability for wastewater disposal
- Onsite sewage (septic) system design review
- Ensuring systems are installed in accordance with design and proper practice
- Final inspections of newly installed/repaired systems
- Work with homeowners to ensure systems are inspected and maintained
- Response to sewage complaints
- Partners with homeowners to repair systems that are failing or in distress
- Licensing Onsite Installers, Maintenance Service Providers and Pumpers

3.2 Large Onsite Sewage System (LOSS)

Traditionally, on-site treatment occurs through a septic tank and drain field, located on or near the property where the sewage is produced. Other higher level treatment methods, in combination with a drain field, are becoming more common, particularly when there is a concern about nutrients such as nitrates in the groundwater or when a drain field is less able to provide adequate treatment.

Large On-site Sewage Systems (LOSS) convey, store, treat, and provide subsurface soil treatment and disposal of domestic sewage. Their design flow is between 3,500 to 100,000 gallons per day. LOSS offer an alternative to centralized municipal sewage treatment plants and can serve from 10 to about 370 individual residences, or equivalent flows from schools and churches, campgrounds and recreation vehicle parks, resorts or state park sites, or smaller cities or towns.

Certain types of wastewater and sewage are not allowed to be treated by or flow into a LOSS, including industrial wastewater and storm water.



State Department:

- Washington State **Department of Health** LOSS Program staff review and approve LOSS project applications state-wide.
- All existing LOSS are required to obtain and renew annual operating permits from the Department of Health.
- Some LOSS were previously regulated and permitted by either the Washington State
 Department of Ecology or local health jurisdictions. The regulatory authority for these LOSS transferred to Health when the revised rule became effective.
- The Department of Ecology reviews, permits, and regulates systems that treat industrial wastewater and storm water.

4 Well System

4.1 Washington State Governance

Onamac has a GROUP A Water System (15 or more connections) governed primarily by Washington State.

Washington State Department:

- For Group A water systems, Island County Public Health staff issues water availability verification for building and sewage permits and review QSS surveys by delegation.
- All other Group A water system requirements are in the jurisdiction with the Washington State Department of Health (DOH) and not with Island County Public Health.
- Regional Engineers with the State DOH are responsible for the implementation of the state's
 drinking water program in assigned counties. They conduct sanitary surveys and special purpose
 investigations of public water systems and promote needed water facility improvements. They
 also review and approve water system plans and specifications for system improvements and
 provide technical assistance to purveyors and local health departments upon request.

4.2.2 Water Resource Advisory Committee

The mission of the Water Resource Advisory Committee is to ensure that the water resources of Island County are managed and protected in such a way as to ensure sustainable use, while protecting habitat, environmental and human health.

The purpose of the Water Resource Advisory Committee is to develop and oversee the implementation and evaluation of a comprehensive water resources program in Island County. We encourage public awareness, education, and involvement in water related issues.

There are twelve members on the Water Resource Advisory Committee. Four for each of the county's distinct geographical areas - North Whidbey, Central/South Whidbey, and Camano Island - representing the four water resource interests of Groundwater, Storm water, Watershed Management, and Salmon Recovery.

5 HOA Guidelines

Homeowner Associations are governed by a chain of governing documents and laws.

- The **Articles of Incorporation** filed with the Secretary of State provide the legal basis of the association in the form of an Incorporated Non-Profit Corporation.
- The recorded map or 'plat' defines each owner's title to property including the association's title to common areas.
- The CCR's (Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions) are publicly recorded deed restrictions.
- The **Bylaws** are the rules for management and administration.
- Resolutions are additional rules and regulations that the association may adopt.
- Federal Laws also apply. Some but not all include the Fair Housing Act, Internal Revenue Codes, the American Disabilities Act, the Virginia Graeme Baker Pool and Spa Safety Act, the FCC OTARD Rule (Over the Air Reception Devices - Satellite Dishes) and the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act.
- Information regarding **Washington State Law** specific to common interest communities such as homeowner associations are provided below. In addition there are typically additional state laws that are not specific to Common Interest Communities which require compliance. Some examples include storm water runoff, coastal development, to name a few.
- **Local Ordinances**, while not specific to homeowner associations, apply to building codes, animal control, abandoned cars, water restrictions, etc.
- Additional legal regulations can exist in the form of case law; standards set by professional
 organizations such as accountants, engineers, architects, home inspectors, and real estate
 brokers; as well as lender requirements.

Considerations:


- State laws affecting Common Interest Communities vary widely.
- Bills affecting Common Interest Communities are frequently being introduced in state legislatures and may be in different stages of consideration, approval, or enactment.
- It is not uncommon to find conflicts within or between governing documents such as the covenants and the bylaws. There may also be conflicts between governing documents and statutes. When this occurs, attorneys must often consider applying Rules of Interpretation.
- Because of the wide variance in state laws, constant changes and possible conflicts in governing
 documents or statutes, it is strongly recommended that association boards and members seek
 legal counsel and especially with firms that have expertise or strong practice experience in the
 area of Common Interest Community law.

6.1 Development Information Bulletins

Island County staff is in the process of updating all Development Information Bulletins (DIBs). DIBs provide general information and answer commonly asked questions regarding permits, procedures, and regulations. Regulations are often written in a style difficult to comprehend, interpret, and apply to specific situations. DIBs are an attempt to translate the legalese of regulations into clear and common language. In the DIBs, excerpts from regulations are combined with plain-language explanations, rewording of complex passages, and some interpretation by staff. While the hope is that use of the DIBs will reduce expense and effort, reading the regulations in some cases may be required.
